wildflower meadows sway gently in the breeze, hedgerows begin to swell with fruits and most birds have quietened down after the drama of previous months. Yet there is still much to see on a hot summer's day.

July is a fantastic month for butterflies, with dozens of species on the wing. Dragonflies dance above our waterways, bees are busy in fields and gardens and Swifts, Swallows and House or even Sand Martins swoop through the summer skies. Bats rule the air on warm still evenings.

Hedgerows are the forgotten heroes of our landscape, so let's celebrate them! To mark the success of our Hedgerow Heritage project (www.saveourhedgerows.co.uk), Surrey Wildlife Trust invites you to what is probably the UK's very first hedgerow-themed music and arts festival this October 21st.

Hosted by West Horsley Place, near Guildford, the day will feature great music from local performers as well as educational talks, storytelling, guided walks, art displays, roaming performances from Guildford Shakespeare, good food and locally brewed refreshments. 

JULY Cinnabar Moth Catterpillars

The black and yellow caterpillars of the Cinnabar Moth are a common sight on poisonous ragwort plants in July. The caterpillar's bright colours warn predators not to eat them, giving a strong signal that they are as toxic as the plants they feed on!



JULY Painted Lady

A well-travelled migrant, the Painted Lady travels here every summer from Europe and Africa. This beautiful orange-and-black butterfly regularly visits gardens and can arrive in huge numbers if the conditions are right.
